Civic Engagement and Outreach

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Ruth Bader Ginsburg said, "Fight for the things that you care about, but do it in a way that will lead others to join you."

This is what GFWC-NH members have done. We have worked on 208 Projects and Programs and tallied 9,855 Hours. Clubs Donated: \$130,265, Gave In-Kind: \$100,624.00 and Dollars Raised: \$13,347.00 Some of our NH club's outstanding projects are mentioned here.

The **Salem Area Women's Club** continued their TOTE (Transitional Opportunities to Evolve) program with Family Promise, a residential facility that houses homeless families and provides support to assist them to rejoin the community with job skills, financial advice and education opportunities and furnishings for a new home when possible. Their program included the following highlights:

Members donated a monthly meal, purchased and brought the food to Family Promise facility, where they cooked and prepared the meal while interacting with the residents. The club served 600 meals in a 10-month period at the cost of \$220 per meal (all In-Kind).

The members of the club worked with Family Promise to design and decorate their family room. Members donated clothing and furniture for those residents moving out of transition.

For the holidays, members took the name and wish list of a resident (adults and children) of Family Promise and provided gifts to all.

All club outreach was displayed on their FB and website, Salem Face Book page and Salem and Nashua town sites.

85 members, 242 hours, \$5700. In-Kind Donations

The president of the **Exeter Area GFWC**, chose Food Insecurity as her President's Project. She chose five nonprofit, 501(c)(3) seacoast organizations as recipients of a cash donation of \$1000.00 each and arranged with each for the club to provide hands-on work. Gather, St. Vincent de Paul, Seacoast Family Promise, End 68 Hours of Hunger and New Generation were the chosen nonprofits. Gather is an outdoor, mobile food mart. Vans travel to central points along the seacoast to offer nutrition- packed food to low-income families/individuals. Gather offers fresh produce and a food pantry. 18 Club members volunteered to assist to pass out food for a combined 77 hours. St. Vincent de Paul supports citizens and families facing food insecurity. Members held a food drive at a local grocery store, informing shoppers of St Vincent and asking for food donations. 15 members worked for 28 hours to fill the St. Vincent van. Seacoast Family Promise is transitional housing for those families suffering from food insecurity and homelessness. 5 members assisted staff with cleaning up the yard and the children's play area. Toiletries valued at \$160. were donated, along with essentials for toddlers at a value of

\$307.00. New Generation is emergency transitional housing supporting homeless pregnant women or those with babies. Their immediate needs last spring were Birthday Bags. Club members filled 12 bags with age- appropriate books, toys, birthday celebration items valued at \$270.00, 24 hours. End 68 Hours of Hunger supplies food to a child at school on Friday to take home and eat throughout the weekend – 68 hours! Members collected, sorted, stacked on shelves, packed into packs at the main facility and delivered to schools. 8 members spent 55 hours. 36 members, 194 hours, \$5000.00 dollars donated, \$737.00 In-Kind Donations.

Candia Community Woman's Club joined forces with the Cub/Boy Scouts by organizing a community food drive, "Scouting for Food". The scouts mailed a flyer to all residents of Candia to inform them of the event and the items most needed for the Candia Food Pantry. The following week, the scouts/families drove around town and picked up the donated items, delivering them to the food pantry. Candia club members, scouts and families then sorted, dated, and stocked the food pantry with all donations. 2,940 items were collected. 14 members, 72 hours, \$8,820.00 In-Kind

The **GFWC Hudson Women's Club** is a valuable and trusted part of the town's election machinery! They sponsored a Candidates' Night prior to the 2022 March election. They assisted the Moderator in collating the pages of the town ballot and then counted school and town ballots in piles of 50 to verify the number of votes. Following the March election, members met at Town Hall to reconcile voter books and tally ballots marked by hand. Members were also asked to assist in a recount. The club was paid by the town for these duties and earned money by providing dinners for poll workers and a bake sale. 36 Members, 335 hours, \$600.00 In-Kind, \$2047.00 Dollars raised!

Hollis Woman's Club lit up their community with the Annual Luminaria Stroll, an all-day event organized and sponsored by the club, with ALL labor by the club, to celebrate the holidays and encourage the community to joyously gather. The event was comprised of a gingerbread house contest, lighting the luminaria all over the town center, chili supper at a central church, craft vendors at Town Hall, lighted truck and tractor parade, photos with Santa, cookie sales (baked by club and sold in fancy boxes), a town band concert at the High School in the evening. \$1300. was raised for the club's scholarship fund. 90 members, 100 Hours, \$1400.00 Dollars Donated, \$250. In-Kind

Health and Wellness Community Service Program aims to explore opportunities for awareness in three areas: disease awareness and prevention, nutrition and physical and emotional care encompassing body, mind and spirit.

TOP Project Award -Salem Area Women's Club GFWC-NH -Everyone Deserves A Happy Family

The Center for Life Management provides a comprehensive suite of mental health and substance use services, psychiatric treatment, acute care, medication services, emergency intervention, and family and family support services. They work closely with a variety of regional health and human services providers to ensure mental health care is comprehensive, integrated and community based. Salem Club supported CLM through a sponsor donation for their annual event -a concert and silent action.

GFWC-NH CLUB CREATIVITY Award- GFWC Dover Area Woman's Club- Twenty- One Senses- Inclusion, Education and Support

GFWC DAWC partnered with the Dover Chamber of Commerce and Twenty-One Senses to run Apple Harvest's first Calm Space/Family Respite Area. Twenty-One Senses' mission is to teach communities to support the inclusion, dignity and well-being of the 17 % of people living with sensory disabilities.

Sensory disabilities affect how the brain translates senses. The designated space enables people to relax, re-regulate and then go back to the festivities. Quieter activities were clustered and set up toward the back. Members set up a balance board, rocker lounger, wiggle seat, coloring tables, sensory tables, play tent and many other areas. They monitored the area and talked with parents. The space also included a much appreciated changing and nursing tent. It was rewarding to see how the children liked the area and the calming effect it had on everyone. Club women embraced the project with little knowledge and saw the benefits firsthand. Wouldn't it be wonderful for more clubs to learn about Twenty-One Senses?

To keep the ball rolling we would like to continue Walking Clubs and maybe add a special Mother's Day event next year. We encourage clubs to raise awareness and show support by participating in Fundraiser walks for Breast Cancer, Alzheimer's, St Jude's and other worthwhile causes.

As Scholarship Chair it is my pleasure to introduce this year's winners of our two \$2000 scholarships given by our NH Federation to NH High School graduates. Both scholarships are given out at the beginning of the recipient's second semester.

The **Mrs. Dexter Otis Arnold Scholarship** is available to a female resident of NH graduating from high school who will enter an accredited NH college or university.

Ava Walsh is a member of the class of 2024 at Hopkinton Middle High School. She has completed all the requirements to graduate a year early plus has taken four college courses.

She and her sister have been in a guardianship for the past eight years and she does maintain a relationship with her mother.

Ava will attend New England College to obtain her Nursing Degree. She has been President of a very active 4-H club for the last four years and hopes to raise livestock throughout her lifetime. She works 20 hours a week during the school year and plans to continue during college. The last sentence in her essay is "Will you help me achieve my academic goals?

The Scholarship Committee is pleased to help Ava!

The **GFWC-NH Scholarship** is available to a male or female high school senior, residing in New Hampshire, and will be attending any accredited university, college, technical or specialty school. This scholarship is based on community service, achievement, financial need, leadership, the applicant's individual determination, and school activities.

Brian Perry Jr. of Milan, a senior at Berlin Middle High School, has been chosen to receive the GFWC-NH Scholarship. He intends to major in Exercise Science at UNH.

Brian's essay clearly shows he read the criteria for this scholarship. He mentions his community service, being captain of both the basketball and the baseball teams this year, "determination to always be better" and financial need. I'll now support his claims. Between National Honor Society and Key Club, Brian has volunteered over 100 hours in two years. Leadership is proven when your teammates elect you as their captain. Brian's opening sentence reads "I am pursuing further education to give myself and hopefully my family a better life." He lives with his Grandparents but maintains a relationship with his parents as they struggle with addiction. He has known homelessness. He is graduating in the top 1/6 of his class and works two jobs during the school year.

Elevator Speech

WHAT IS IT?

An elevator speech is an overview of an idea for a product, service or project. The name reflects the fact that an elevator speech can be delivered in the time span of an elevator ride, which is approximately 30 seconds. The idea of an elevator speech is to have a prepared presentation that grabs attention and says a lot in a few words.

An effective elevator speech comes in handy when you are attending an event, conference or some other type of meeting with networking opportunities. Have you ever noticed that one of the first questions people ask is "and what do you do?" Your usual canned response is - Oh - I am teacher, or I am a business owner, or I am retired. However, if you turn your message around and start with an answer such as "I am dedicated to community improvement by enhancing the lives of others through volunteer service- don't you think their ears will perk up and they will want to know more?

So, what comes next? This is where your pitch, or elevator speech, comes in. Let's be honest-many of us may freeze up or fumble as we search for the words to explain all the awesome work we do as an organization. Here are some tips to help you to engage potential members or supporters when they ask "What exactly is GFWC?"

WHERE DO I BEGIN?

- 1. Who am I? Are you a Club member, Club or State Officer or Committee member? Introduce yourself that way, such as "I am Nancy Ames, GFWC Maine President- elect and a member of the Semper Fidelis Club here in town."
- 2. What am I trying to accomplish? Make it personal GFWC motivates us all in different ways, so think about what makes you excited to be a member. There are several aspects to choose from, including service projects, fundraising, community involvement, or social interaction. If you believe strongly in what you are conveying and are sincere, it will make your pitch more effective. Keep it short and to the point. "Our Club is involved in projects around our community to improve the lives of others. A recent project we did

- was to sponsor a 3 mile walk around our town to bring awareness to Alzheimer's. We simply asked anyone who was interested in walking to show up in purple and donate \$10. We raised over \$700 for the Alzheimer's Association of Maine.
- 3. End with an Action or your "Hook. This will give you an opening to either continue the conversation or get the potential Member's contact information. A great example is to ask "If you could improve one thing in your community, what would it be?" Making the question personal will hopefully encourage a meaningful conversation. Does your Club have business cards or brochures with your Club's contact information? Invite them to a meeting or an upcoming project or fundraising event. Ask them for their contact information.

Keep in mind the basic elements of an effective elevator speech:

- 1. Be concise use as few words as possible.
- 2. Be clear An effective elevator speech is one that can be understood by your parents, grandparents and the kid next door. Make sure your audience understands what you are talking about and what's in it for them.
- 3. Be informative As much as possible, an effective elevator speech is specific and tangible. Talk about leadership, accomplishments and goals.
- 4. Be engaging This should be a conversation starter, not a monologue. You want to spark the interest of your audience, not bore them.
- 5. Finish with a request At the end of your pitch, you must ask for something. Do you want to invite them to a meeting, donate for an event, work with them on a project?

And then finally - Practice, practice, practice! This is probably the most important factor of all, because when someone asks you "What is GFWC?" and you fumble and freeze, the opportunity to recruit a new member or supporter may be lost. Use a family member, a mirror, or give your speech to the casserole in the oven - whatever works for you. Practicing will ensure that the next time you get an opportunity to speak about GFWC you will be prepared to rise to the occasion!





GFWC Concord Contemporary Club

The GFWC Concord Contemporary Club continued to stay busy throughout the end of winter and into early spring. One of our ongoing projects finds us supporting Pine Haven Boys Center, a private, non-profit intensive residential facility that cares for boys with behavioral, educational or emotional problems. 
